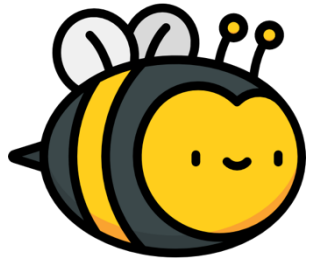


AED Locations

Anaphylaxis



- Anaphylaxis is a severe, potentially life-threatening allergic reaction. Symptoms can affect several areas of the body, including breathing and blood circulation (see *handout*)
- Every student with a known anaphylactic allergy has an EpiPen in the office
- Stock EpiPens are also in the office for students or staff with undocumented anaphylactic allergies
- Students with documented allergies will be on your Medical Alert list
- If an EpiPen is administered, we are required to call 911

Bottom-line: Having an anaphylactic attack is easy, like riding a bike, except the bike is on fire, you're on fire, everything is on fire!

Bloodborne Pathogens



- **Universal Precautions** – always treat all unknown blood and bodily fluids as potentially infectious to prevent exposure of bloodborne pathogens
- Use gloves before handling bodily fluids i.e. bloody nose
- If you come into contact with or are exposed to bodily fluids, report to Michelle (exposure incident)
- Bottom-line: If it's wet, sticky, and not yours – don't touch it
